Mosquito Season has arrived Protect your pet from Heartworm!




As you lie in bed you hear a high pitched whine of a female mosquito looking for a blood meal so she can produce a mass of eggs.

Unfortunately mosquitoes also carry some unwanted parasites including viral encephalitis, West malaria, yellow fever, and dog heart worms. When the mosquito feeds on your blood or your dog's or cat's blood the unwelcome hitchhiker gets into the blood stream and eventually invades the pulmonary arteries of the heart. Initially there will be few symptoms. As more worms reach the dog or cat becomes weaker and eventually will die. It is not an easy way to die. Initially there may be a persistent cough. Once the number of worms increase, the pet will become lethargic, reluctant to exercise, tire easily during exercise, lack of appetite and weight loss.

Your pet's veterinarian can draw some blood to run a test for the presence of heat worms. If there are heart worms present, the doctor will prescribe a drug to kill the heartworms slowly. Rapid death of the mass of heartworms could cause the pet to die due to toxic by-products released from the worm bodies. There is no cure for heartworm infected cats.

Better yet, if the animal is negative you can start your pet on heartworm preventative that is given once a month. In addition, make sure you are not producing mosquitoes in your own property. Anything that can hold water for a week or two can become home for mosquito larvae: the saucers under plants, old tires, empty cans, even a foot track filled with water can be loaded with mosquito larvae. Empty pet's water bowl every day and refill with fresh water. Remove any thing that can hold water or make sure the water doesn't stay in the container for more than a week. Old outdoor pools or ponds can be a source as well.






